

Call for Open Contribution to CALASYS

Dear colleagues,

By opening CALASYS to all, each contributing individual, committee, and chapter will be able to deposit works and documents. You can also be the manager of your collection after going through training with the Committee. It is hoped that CALASYS will continue to grow at a faster pace and in a more inclusive direction.

CALASYS hosts scholarly works and educational materials from our members, the Chinese American Librarians as well as educators and professionals in the LIS field. It also archives CALA's official documents, CALA and its Chapters' conference materials, and Chinese cultural heritage collections. Currently, 34 collections have been created for individuals, and over 30 collections have been created for CALA Archives and Chapter collections. In total over 500 items have been added to CALASYS' open and private collections. As of November 1, 2021, it reached 589833 views for this year.

CALASYS accepts clear copyright full text as well as bibliographies. By submitting your work, you grant CALASYS non-exclusive rights to distribute your submission ("the Work") over the Internet. The original copyright holder of the work will retain the copyright. The contributions could be, but not limited to:

- 1. Scholarly publications (journal articles, books, book chapters, etc. Abstracts with bibliographic information or access links are welcome).
- 2. Educational/instructional and training materials (presentation files, audio/video materials for workshops/training, curriculum designs, syllabus of LIS courses, guides, reports, datasets, etc.)
- 3. CALA's official documents, CALA Chapters' conference, training, and other event materials.
- 4. Other collections and materials on Chinese-American librarianship, Chinese cultural heritage, and Chinese studies.

Visiting Scholar Programming at the Illinois Fire Service Institute (IFSI)

On July 30, 2021, through the Visiting Scholar Program at the Illinois Fire Service Institute (IFSI), University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, Dr. Jiuming Ji, a Research Librarian from East China University of Science and Technology Library gave a talk titled "Libraries COVID Responses in China" via Zoom. Back in March, Lindsay King, the Associate Director for Access and Research Services of Robert B. Haas Family Arts Library at the Yale University Library, gave a presentation on "Staying Open and Staying Safe: COVID-19 and The Yale Library". These online scholarly activities were organized by the IFSI

International Programs. The most recent event was held on October 7. The Adult Services Manager, Tricia Duzan and the Reference Librarian, Eva Liu, from Champaign Public Library gave a talk on the topic of public library user services and how to promote library services during COVID pandemic. 51 participants attended this event via Zoom. Since April 2020, IFSI International Programs has organized 29 online activities with a total of 826 participants.

The Visiting Scholar Program has accepted the application of three scholars from China since August this year during the pandemic. They all arrived in Champaign, Illinois safely.



CALA Southwest and Southeast Chapters Joint Online Conference

The CALA Southeast and Southwest Chapters Joint Online Conference was held successfully on May 7, 2021, 12-2:30pm Central Time. Thanks to the Conference Planning Committee of both CALA Southwest Chapter chaired by Anna Xiong from Rice University and Southeast Chapter chaired by Jianying Shou from Duke University.

The conference started with an enthusiastic opening remark delivered by CALA President Hong Yao. It was followed by four presentations mainly focusing on the challenges librarians encountered during the Covid pandemic. Each presentation was limited to 15-25 minutes and was followed by a 30 -minute question and answer (Q & A) session at the end of the four presentations.

The four presentation are:

- 1. "Usability Study for TDR" by Zhihong Xu, Associate Professor/Data Management Librarian at Texas A&M University Libraries
- 2. "Just Keep Trying: Experiments in Outreach and Engagement During a Pandemic" by Zackary Chance Medlin, Learning & Student Engagement Librarian at Texas A&M University Libraries
- 3. "Improvisation in Improbable Times: Pivoting to a Tele-Reference Service Model " by Sandy Avila, Science Librarian; Richard Harrison, Subject Librarian; Sarah Norris, Scholarly Communication Librarian; Min Tong, Business Librarian, University of Central Florida Libraries
- 4. "Civic Engagement during the Pandemic" by Jian Anna Xiong, Government Information Coordinator; Amanda Thomas, User Experience/Public Services Librarian, Rice University

The presentations were very engaging and people actively participated in the Q & A session. The presenters had their presentation recorded and were encouraged to upload their presentations to CALA's online repository "CALASYS." The joint conference has drawn over 30 attendants of CALA members and non-members. In order to continue promoting CALA and the CALA Southwest and Southeast Chapters, at the end of the Conference, the Vice Presidents/incoming Presidents were invited to give a brief self-introduction and the background information of the Chapters they represented. The conference achieved the goal of providing a platform for librarians, especially Chinese American librarians, to demonstrate their efforts at improving the library services to users by sharing their stories and their contributions to the library community.

2021 Open Education Conference (#OpenEd21)

With CALA's generosity, I was able to attend the 2021 Open Education Conference for the first time this October. The conference was completely online, consisting of live sessions, pre-recorded sessions where presenters were there to answer questions from the audience, and social activities. "Making Open for All" was the theme this year and the variety of sessions reflected this.

The opening keynote focused on trauma-informed pedagogy. Dr. Imad discussed personal, collective, and intergenerational trauma – from racism, erasure, poverty, colonialism, wars, mass shootings, and more. Members of the audience also shared how the COVID-19 pandemic has been a traumatic experience. Of Dr. Imad's 10 tips for trauma-informed care, #5 – "empower people through knowledge, voice, and choice" – resonated most with me as it concerns open education.

Sessions about diversity, equity, inclusion, and social justice in open education were of great interest to me. "Institutional Transformation Towards OER: Community of Practice, Diversity Assessment, and Policy" was about Towson University's OER initiative and the presenters shared the cultural relevancy checklist that is part of its assessment. "Zoom In: A Faculty Panel on Creating Renewable Assignments Using Lambert's Social Justice Framework" featured faculty in the New England Board of Higher Education's Community of Practice that implemented open pedagogy, where faculty created renewable assignments and tried to engage students in more authentic, culturally relevant teaching and learning experiences.

There were a number of sessions on open pedagogy. In "Building Digital Editions for and with Students" and "Technology, OER, and Open Pedagogy: Diverse Voices of the Past & Present" faculty shared the tools they and their students used (e.g., Etherpad, Omeka, Pressbooks, Scalar, WordPress, and learning management systems) to revise and remix openly licensed/public domain materials in order to enhance them with documents, images, etc.

Since I am a science librarian, I also attended a number of sessions related to the sciences. I learned that the free online course management system, MyOpenMath, includes homework assignments for chemistry (as well as content for math, physics, and astronomy). I also learned that faculty at Georgia Southern University utilized LibGuides to post their OER textbooks for the organic chemistry and organic chemistry laboratory courses.

For further professional development in open education, there are the ACRL Off-Roadshow for OER & Affordability, OEN Certificate in OER Librarianship, and SPARC Open Education Leadership Program (per "Professional Development for Open Education Leaders: A Community Dialogue").

"America Reads Constitution" Online Program - 2021 Rice University Fondren Library U.S. Constitution Day Celebration

2021 is the 234th Anniversary of the U.S. Constitution. To celebrate, Anna Xiong, Immediate Past President of CALA Southwest Chapter and Government Information Coordinator of Kelley Center for Government Information, Data and Geospatial Services of Fondren Library at Rice University initiated and led a special virtual recording project called "America Reads Constitution", which was inspired by the tradition of the US House of Representatives, where members read the Constitution on site every year on the Constitution Day since 2011, (House Reading of the Constitution) and by similar practice of the National Constitution Center (American Epic: Reading the U.S. Constitution).


The final recording was premiered over YouTube at 2 p.m. CDT, on September 17 to the public with the goal of encouraging everyone to read one of the most important US founding documents from start to finish, from "We the People" to the final words of the 27th Amendment. Regardless of people's age, ethnicity, gender, political view or social and economic status, everyone was welcome to read together.

The special recording project was widely supported by passionate volunteer readers from both Rice University and the local Houston community: from middle schoolers, to retired elderly; men and women, people from different racial and ethnic backgrounds, from University administrators to faculty, staff, and students; people all joined in. Fondren Library's C-MAC Committee and Digital Media Center helped with promotion and provided the technical support. Kelley Center student Lucy Hernandez and a junior volunteer from Houston's Bellaire High School Joshua Cheng helped with editing the video. Joshua Cheng is a talented young pianist and a passionate congressional debater. He played "America the Beautiful" before the reading started, which added a beautiful musical touch to the recording.

It lasted about 1 hour 15 min. The collaborative work was a great civic engagement outreach and promotion experience for both Kelley Center and the community. The project has received a lot of great comments and was not possible without all the support received.

The celebration event has also a smaller scale on-site component. This year Kelly Center has purchased a copy of the U.S. Constitution with the amendments, which has the height of a real person. People can read and take pictures with it. Next to it the library has set up a self-service table, where the staff prepared a few pages of vintage effects, ancient looking paper for library visitors to have a fun, symbolic experience of signing the Constitution with the founding fathers. At the table, the visitors could also get free-to-take pocket constitutions and information sheets about voter registration and election, which is an important human right protected by the Constitution. In the basement near Kelley Center, the staff also have set up three on site exhibits to educate the library visitors about the voting act, related research resources, and the history of the constitutional amendments on voting and election. In 2019, building on that work, I was the Northern CA Chapter President of CALA and co-organized another meeting featuring members such as BPLG President Esmeraldera Casas and many CALA members in the region. In the Bay Area, we organized this one day meeting to celebrate Asian Pacific American Heritage and also to hear from library leaders such as former CALA President Haipeng Li and REFORMA President Sandra Rios Balderrama. It gave us a chance to share stories, to network and to bring our national associations together.

I continue to serve on both associations and continue to advance the values of equity, diversity, inclusion, in our profession. 

In addition, the ALA Endowment Trustees have the authority to hold, invest, reinvest, and disburse endowment funds and otherwise deal with endowment funds in accordance with such directions as may be given them by the Executive Board of the Association.





Post-Covid Work & Life

Having started my job virtually in December 2020, I did not have a "return" to the office. Rather, July 2021 was when I first started working on-campus, despite already having been employed for several months! Launching my career virtually, in the midst of a pandemic, had its own challenges, including learning to adjust to working in the office after establishing certain rhythms while working remotely. At home I became accustomed to snuggling with my cat, wrapping myself in blankets, and eating hot lunches every day - luxuries which definitely made the workday more comfortable.

Although the physical setting of my living room was very cozy, starting a career virtually was an unusual and isolating experience. I am an extravert who feels energized when around other people, so I found working by myself all day very unpleasant. I did meet my colleagues in team meetings and was in constant contact with my supervisor, so although I had never spent time in an office with my fellow librarians, I felt connected to the other staff and felt engaged with my work. From the beginning my coworkers made efforts to make me feel included by inviting me to join their committees and participate in virtual social activities.

When it was announced that librarians could work in the library in July 2021, I took the earliest possible opportunity to start working in the office. In preparation for working onsite, I created a list of supplies and personal effects that I wanted to take in to personalize my space. I also biked the route from my home to work a few times to familiarize myself with the route. My daily bike commute takes me down a bike path by Lake Mendota, which is an incredible way to start the morning.

The first day I came into my office, I couldn't figure out how to open my door! I turned the keys and tried to pull the door, but couldn't open it. One of my colleagues heard me rattling the door and kindly explained that my office door needed to be pushed, not pulled. Another colleague also gave me a tour of the library, which I had seen previously but was still having trouble navigating. Despite my unfamiliarity with the facilities, I found my office a comfortable and well-equipped space to do my work.

I prefer working from the office to working from home, especially because I enjoy being around my colleagues and patrons. Additionally, having more work/life separation has been a relief as I can go home after the workday and leave my work in the office. Since most of my meetings are virtual there are still some colleagues I have still never met in person, despite having been at this job for almost a full year now! My first year of my career as a professional academic librarian has certainly been strange, but I am grateful for my colleagues who welcomed me warmly when I started and helped me transition to onsite work.

Work & Life During Pandemic

In March 2020, due to the pandemic, our Library temporarily closed the buildings which encompassed the in-person programs and services. On the other hand, the Library online services stayed strong. These services included virtual references, storytimes, events and workshops. Our Library website, Facebook and other social media outlets remained very active.

As a Bilingual Regional Librarian, I coordinated and worked closely with the team in reaching out and stayed connected with the community via phone, email, Wechat, etc. We also provided virtual workshops, events and tech help. Our Library started providing in-person curbside service several months later. Even though we were shielded by plexiglass and masks, the curbside service was a great opportunity for staff to meet patrons in person. We welcomed patrons to pick up their on hold items and the book bundles.

In a way, it was perfect timing to reopen the buildings for the public, during that same month, Portland experienced an historic heatwave for several days. With the County support, library staff provided bottled water for patrons to stay hydrated.

On a personal note, the pandemic was a wake up call and a humbling experience. It was a time to reflect and re-evaluate what truly holds dear to me. Keeping close connection with family members is the top priority and staying healthy is second, and my Library profession comes right after. In addition, the pandemic was a time to adopt and explore new solutions. With three children and two were attending online schools, my wife and I rearranged our furniture and working stations at home. So that when we all had meetings at the same time, the noise level was manageable.

Illinois Fire Service Institute Library Post-Covid Work & Life: Staying Safe While Keeping Open

The Illinois Fire Service Institute (IFSI) is Illinois' statutory fire academy and offers training courses online, around the state, and in-person at the Champaign campus for firefighters, including volunteer firefighters. IFSI's mission is to *Help Firefighters do their Work through Training, Education, Information and Research.* Since opening in 1990, the IFSI library has worked to support all four areas of IFSI's mission by providing information and resources to firefighters across the state. The library's mission is to provide fire and emergency library and information assistance and services to the Institute's instructional staff, students, Illinois fire departments and firefighters, and other fire/emergency-related users in the successful and effective performance of their duty. *The library holds the largest collection of fire service multi-media resources in Illinois and is one of the top three fire academy libraries in the nation.* As the *only* fire service dedicated library in Illinois, the IFSI library has become a crucial resource for firefighters. Illinois' firefighting community consists of 1,108 fire departments and 41,283 firefighters. Volunteer firefighters make up over sixty-five percent of firefighters in the state of Illinois. Of the library's databases, the most notable and well-received includes the Illinois Firefighter Line of Duty Deaths Digital Image Collection Database (IFLODD). IFLODD is the most comprehensive database in existence of Illinois firefighters who have died in the line of duty over the past 160 years, with over 906 total records including COVID-19 related LODD, 706 total incident summaries, 1524 total images, and 14 total oral history interviews with transcripts. IFLODD has been used for training, research, the teaching of firefighters, and by fire departments for reoccurring training.

The IFSI Library staff consists of four librarians and a team of six graduate students from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign iSchool. The library employees worked from home from March 2020 to May 2021, then gradually returned to the library with a combination of remote and onsite and followed policies to keep themselves and patrons safe while continuing to provide services. The library provided remote services and curbside pickup when the interlibrary loan service was put on hold when public libraries closed their doors. The library reference desk is equipped with a glass window to protect library employees. There is a mask mandate in place at work by the institute, so wearing masks and keeping a social distance are required in the library. Employees in the library followed the updated Institute COVID policy while remaining open. Library staff are fully vaccinated, and uploaded their vaccination card at the Institute Resource Center. On a daily basis, the library staff spray and wipe shared computers, phones, work surfaces, use hand sanitizer, work behind a plexiglass shield, and make sure there is plenty of hand sanitizer and cleaning spray available for use. Library employees' well-being is carefully monitored and regularly checked at weekly Zoom meetings and through frequent phone and email communication. The support of IFSI administration through a weekly Zoom check-in meeting has been positive and encouraging. During the pandemic, the library developed more LibGuides that are popular, and the searchable International Programs Databases for several key programs were developed with good progress. During this challenging time, the library team feels even closer to each other. They are able to spend more time with families and appreciate life more like everyone else. Working virtually has gone smoothly because of the availability of Zoom to keep in touch and keep good communications going to carry on with tasks and complete work on time. Communications could be harder sometimes because of the remote distance and need more time to explain and follow up on progress. When the pandemic hit, two librarians did not have a laptop to work at home. It has taken a while to get the laptops ready and catch up with their work.

What we have learned from the Pandemic is to be well-prepared for unexpected situations, and to have good planning. Ongoing and open communication helps to increase the effectiveness and efficiency of teamwork. It has helped us continue to provide high quality services to meet Illinois firefighters' dynamic needs in a timely manner.

Work & Life During Covid

Covid took us by surprise in the early spring last year. I remember that spring break, the last week that we were all at the library before we moved to remote work, when everyone was anxiously waiting to hear back from the library administration on decisions. Not long before that, I was frantically searching for masks and sending them back to my family in China. Suddenly I found myself starting to store hand sanitizers and toilet papers too at home. We all began to work from home after the spring break. This was challenging for catalogers because we are used to working with physical materials on a daily basis. I was able to come up with a few project ideas such as training with the new RDA toolkit, updating the Library of Congress Name Authority Records, and cleaning up our records. If there were new books that need cataloging, my supervisor would send me the ISBNs so I can catalog in OCLC Connexion, with any additional information that I could find online. In September, the library allowed staff members to go back to work in the library on a staggered schedule and I volunteered to work two days a week in the library to catalog special collections materials. Before leaving at work, I usually took photos of the book covers and title pages on my phone, so I could continue that work at home. Sometimes I was the only one sitting at the back of the library in the technical services area, but I enjoyed the alone time and played music while I worked. This schedule had lasted for the first half of 2021. As the pandemic eased, my institution made a decision to require all staff members to be back on site beginning in August. So four months later since we all came back to work under the Houston heat, I'm glad to report that the temperature has dropped to a comfortable 60s during the day and we are enjoying the warm winter weather and each other's company now, still with masks and social distance though. The pandemic has taught me many things, perhaps the most important is to be grateful for what I have. Here to wish everyone a healthy and peaceful new year!

His exceptional leadership was inspiring.

He made the workshops welcoming to all participants. He enlightened participants, which include not only librarians but also students, staff and community members. Manuel blazed a trail for others to follow in library services. He was committed throughout his life to investing in the next generation of librarianship and leadership.

He won numerous awards and was featured in *American Libraries Magazine* in 2019, as a public speaking expert: Boost Your Public Speaking Skills | American Libraries Magazine

He was elected as CALA Board of Director, chair of committees at national and chapter levels, Parliamentarian of the CALA Board, and CALA Southern California Chapter President. He served on the editorial board of the *Journal of Library and Information Science* and was the assistant editor of *Occasional Paper Series (OPS)*, etc.

CALA had frequently invited Manuel to serve as Master of Ceremony at numerous CALA programs and awards banquets during ALA and CALA Annual Conferences. Manuel effectively planned and emceed these events with liveliness and good humor. His creativity and artistic talent impressed everyone at present. He always created a cheerful, enthusiastic, laudatory, and entertaining atmosphere for each occasion which kept everyone's mood upbeat throughout the day. Everyone appreciated his hard work and all the efforts he had put in for each event.
